His birth name was Joseph Aloisius Ratzinger. His parents were named George and Maria. His brother and he became priests and his sister became a housekeeper. A few days after he turned 14 years old, he had to go to war. In 1945 he went back to his hometown. He was ordained a priest in 1951.
